The Town Council and staff met in September to discuss and update the 2007/08 Payson Goal Plan (PGP).

The PGP, formerly called the Corporate Strategic Plan, is created by the public, town council and staff to provide a list of goals to be accomplished in the upcoming fiscal year. The PGP also includes performance measures for each goal and which department is responsible for achieving the goal. The PGP helps drive the budget for the upcoming year.

At the September workshop 24 2007/08 goals were removed as completed, modified to reflect partial completion, or moved to the new Operational Goal Plan for continued monitoring.

The Operational Goal Plan was created during the October workshop to ensure that completed goals are monitored and maintained as needed. You can see the 2007/08 completed goals and the new Operational Goal Plan on the Town of Payson website at www.ci.paysonaz.us.

To create the 2008/09 PGP, we need your help. Included in this article is the Input Form, asking what you would like the town to focus on in the upcoming year.

The form is also available on our Web site. Please complete the input form and return it to Town Hall by Dec. 20. We will compile the results and present them to the Town Council at a PGP workshop on Jan. 10 at 9 a.m. in the council chambers.

The January workshop is a public workshop where we are seeking your input. We will be publishing the results in the *Payson Roundup* after Jan. 10, 2008.

The information will also be available on the Town Web site. It is anticipated that the new PGP for 2008/09 will be determined at the February 14th workshop and will be available in the Town Web site later in February.

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Residents to help ID Mesa code violators

Mesa next year becomes the first Valley city to put nosy neighbors to good use spotting obvious city-code violations in an effort to clean up neighborhoods.

Starting in February, the city will establish code teams, groups of neighbors who will note obvious violations such as failure to mow lawns, remove abandoned cars or clear piles of junk out of carports.

The city would then send homeowners a "courtesy letter," giving them seven days to correct the problem or face an inspection by a code-compliance officer. The hope is that most people will voluntarily

comply and avoid enforcement actions that could lead to fines.

"It's just a friendly reminder," said Alma Jones, a southwest Mesa activist. "This is what has been found. Would you take care of the problem? Most people, in general, don't want to live in a rundown neighborhood. That's one of your biggest investments in life."

Mesa's code teams are a spinoff of a successful Texas program, popular in Fort

It works in Texas

Arlington, Texas, "Code Rangers" program:

- 199 volunteer code rangers trained since January.
- Volunteers reported 4,715 violations at 4,580 locations.
- 3,668 complaints substantiated.
- Patterned after a program in Fort Worth.

Worth and Arlington, called the Code Rangers.

Since January, Arlington has trained 199 code rangers who have reported 4,715 code violations at 4,580 locations, said James Triplett, the program's supervisor.

"To this point, I think it's

been a huge success," Triplett said, encouraging community pride. Mike Renshaw, Mesa's acting code-compliance director, said the volunteers will serve as extra sets of eyes for code-compliance officers, but will not have direct contact with their neighbors, in the

hopes of avoiding potential confrontations.

About 10 to 15 residents will undergo about two hours of training in January to learn what they can and can't do to prevent unleashing squads of zoning zealots, he said. Four neighborhoods are being targeted as part of a yearlong experiment.

"That was one concern people had. Will this program turn neighbor against neighbor?" Renshaw said. "We don't want this program to be punitive in any way. It's to encourage the volunteer spirit."
